A note on personal memories may not be an ideal theme for a public platform. It may not elicit interest from many. Some may feel it is purely boisterous. Still, I would like to reflect on my journey as a teacher. Some are born teachers and some acquire the talent by training or learning from their own or others' mistakes. Ultimately, your student decides whether you are successful in your endeavor.

In my childhood, I decide that I will never be a teacher. Reason. My mother is a teacher and because of her, I had to face umpteen problems. Had to be punctual; all homework must be submitted on time; no mingling with boys (that was common for all girls irrespective of your mother being a teacher in the same school or not), not taking part in any of the extracurricular activities, etc, etc. The icing on the cake is I get lower marks for her subject, very important, biology. Musical Intelligence: The talent for rhythm, melody, and sound. **Bodily-Kinesthetic Intelligence:** The ability to use one's body effectively.

Linguistic Intelligence: Proficiency in language and communication. **Logical-Mathematical Intelligence:** The capacity for reasoning, problem- solving, and logical thinking.

Intrapersonal Intelligence: Self-awareness and the ability to understand one's own emotions.

Interpersonal Intelligence: The skill of understanding and interacting effectively with others.

While Gardner did not specifically list emotional intelligence as one of the types, it is evident that emotional intelligence is intertwined with each of these eight types. Emotional intelligence, a critical aspect of overall intelligence, refers to the ability to perceive, process, and

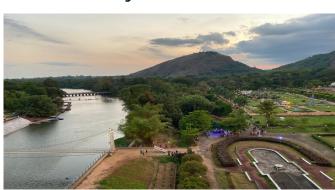

INNOVATIONS IN ORAL CANCER AWARENESS

Almost 7 million people die from cancer each year worldwide, making it the second most prevalent cause of death after coronary heart disease. The WHO estimates that about 35 million individuals worldwide are afflicted with cancer at this time. It is estimated that by 2025, there may be 10 million annual cancer deaths and 25 million new instances of cancer. Oral cancer accounts for 4-5% of these numbers. Therefore, raising community knowledge has become crucial to reducing the enormous number of patients and deaths.

The two main risk factors for mouth cancer are alcohol and tobacco. Additional risk factors include the human papilloma virus (HPV), areca nut, and betel quid. Tobacco usage is connected to the majority of mouth cancer cases. Tobacco products such as cigarettes, cigars, pipes, bidis, and smokeless tobacco (such as snuff and chewing tobacco) all raise the risk of this kind of cancer. Longer periods of time spent consuming these substances carry significant dangers. The chance of developing oral cancer is increased when alcohol and smoke are combined. There is a higher chance of acquiring a secondary mouth cancer if you continue to smoke even after receiving therapy for oral cancer.

Reducing tobacco product use is the main objective in raising awareness of oral cancer, as it is the primary cause according to current research and statistics. This is definitely a task that can only be accomplished with efficient public-government coordination and developments in media technology.

USE OF SOCIAL MEDIA STRATEGY

The quickest and easiest approach to achieve the intended outcome may be through the strategic use of social media. The majority of users take their time browsing through the different content that social media platforms offer. This gives us the opportunity to use this platform to directly present the campaign to them. This can be achieved by developing a social media approach, such as a short film, that effectively communicates the causes, management, prognosis, and prevention of oral cancer.

INVEST IN PACKAGING

YouTubers who post "Unboxing videos" are well-known for receiving a ton of likes. Experience packaging has a peculiar yet lucrative appeal. Therefore, taking into account the desire for unique packaging in addition to suggestions that discourage the use of drugs like tobacco would undoubtedly be beneficial.

RUN A CHALLENGE/GIVE AWAY

For a number of reasons, enticing people with a social media challenge or giveaway is a fantastic idea to raise awareness. Firstly, it fosters genuine relationships by getting individuals to talk about the concept of oral health. Additionally, it forces people to socialize with others. However, utilize a clear Call To Action (CTA) to encourage followers to interact. Introducing popular hashtags is among the simplest methods to achieve this. It is easy to direct visitors seeking for related postings on the advantages of quitting smoking and dental health by developing a specific hashtag, such as "#quit_smoking." Ask them to use the hashtag and begin adding it to the end of the posts.

RUN ONLINE ADS

Running online ads that cannot be skipped will be a great tool while discussing what social media can do in this aspect. This can help millions by providing awareness along with their search results. The best part is that they are just one click away from booking an appointment with the doctor, for those who are willing to quit the habit.

POSTERS/ILLUSTRATIONS

Circulating posters, illustrations, diagrams, videos, cartoons etc through various platforms like either online or offline. Awareness through these mediums helps to create a greater impact than mere words.

SPONSOR EVENTS

Millions of people attend conferences, festivals and other large events every year. Promotion of health awareness campaign at these events can provide professional information that people will be able to take home so that they are introduced or re-introduced to the idea of quitting tobacco.

HOST-OFFLINE EXPERIENCES

With everyone living so much of their life online these days, some people still crave in-person experiences. By initiating programs by health workers collaborating with government authorities, we can offer this idea for hosting offline events. It need not be huge and extravagant. You can even have a god turn out with something like a pop-up- shop or an intimate dinner event. It will highlight the products and services even more- advertisement over the packet.

NON-INVASIVE DIAGNOSTIC METHODS

In terms of technology, non-invasive diagnostic techniques are quite advantageous since most individuals are afraid of the traditional invasive investigative methods for oral cancer. A few examples are saliva-based oral cancer diagnosis tools, light-based oral cancer screening tools, portable oral cancer screening tests, etc. The Sree Chitra Tirunal Institute of Medical Sciences and Technology's homegrown handheld equipment, "Oral scan," is a groundbreaking development in this field. This handheld gadget aids in screening, the identification of oral malignancies, and guidance on biopsy sites. Accurate biopsy sites can prevent the need for additional biopsies in the future and eliminate errors, which lessens patient trauma and anxiety during investigative procedures.

START FROM THE BASE

Dental campuses can be equipped with projections of oral cancer awareness starting from installing a television in the reception that displays commercials/ short films to give awareness. In clinics, with the use of an intra oral camera, we can project the oral tissues to a screen in front of the patient and make them understand the differences between healthy and unhealthy tissues.

It is important to start from the base. Health related topics should be Included in the school curriculum to develop a habit from early childhood like 'watch your mouth' program. It will help the people to understand and also make them aware of their oral health. That would presumably be the greatest contribution to the preventive part of the disease. This can be done once a month/ once in two weeks. Children can be made to pledge allegiance to a tobacco- less community. Policies supervised by the government, such as the declaration of subsidies for individuals who give up smoking and the financing of public awareness programs, role plays, camps, posters, and rallies that serve as ongoing reminders, will guarantee that people do not continue to move closer to this fatal illness in the future. It is crucial that people remember that oral cancer is preventable and may be easily identified in its early stages. This will allow them to get screened quickly, receive timely assistance to finish their recovery and rehabilitation, and go on to lead independent lives.

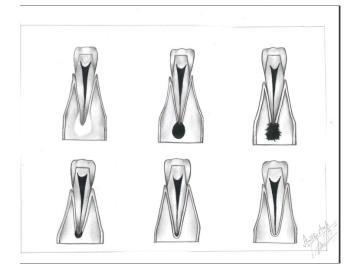

To roam around like a winter breeze, fondling any aching scars.

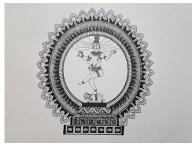
